Chapel Garth Hopes and Fears Workshop - 28th September 2015





October 2015

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INTRODUCTION

This note provides a summary of the workshop which took place to present Siglion's initial proposals for a new housing development at Chapel Garth. This is the first of three scheduled consultation events due to take place.

This feedback will be used to direct the development of the masterplan for the site including location of public green space, location of the local centre, mix of uses in the local centre and access points into and throughout the site.

Background

Siglion is a joint venture between Carillion and Sunderland City Council and is managed by leading property experts igloo Regeneration. They have been appointed to bring forward a residential-led housing development on the Chapel Garth site, which has been included as a site to accomodate housing growth, since it was designated in the Unitary Development Plan, Adopted in 1998.

A multi-disciplinary team of consultants have been appointed by Siglion to produce the planning application including, URBED (Urbanism, Environment and Design) Ltd, providing masterplanning services, Cundall, who will be providing planning and engineering services, Colour Landscape Architects and Argus who will be producing the Ecological Assessments.

URBED are leading the consultation process and will be producing the masterplan for the scheme, due to be submitted as part of the planning application in early 2016.

The nature of the application will be an outline application, therefore some details will not be determined through this process, including housetypes, tenures and aesthetics of individual properties.

Consultation Approach

Siglion are looking to bring forward a development which is not only supported but informed by local people and businesses.

As part of this approach they are carrying out a number of public consultations to open discussion about the site, engage with people on what they would like to see and wouldn't like to see, and get ideas and thoughts on the type and setting of the new development.

This workshop is the first of three planned events to get initial feedback on an emerging masterplan for the site.

The purpose of the workshop was to invite local people and ward councillors together to discuss our aspirations and initial plans for Chapel Garth.



- The workshop was held at 'The Box Youth Project' on Hall Farm Road, opposite the site between 6 and 8pm on Monday 28th September 2015
- Participants were invited to join a table, and group discussions followed a presentation by the Siglion and URBED team.
- The evening was staffed by members of the project team, with representatives from Siglion, URBED, Cundall and Colour.

3.	Hopes and Fears	Each table then took part in group discussions about the site, listing their hopes and fears for the development. A scribe was appointed to take down points.
4.	Introduction to the masterplan	David Rudlin then gave a presentation about the initial masterplan for the scheme, the layout and the amount of housing proposed, the amount of greenspace, connections through the site and the layout of the local centre.
5.	Group discussion	Each table then broke off into group discussion once again to talk through the masterplan and how it compared with their fears and hopes for the site. Feedback from each group was then presented to the room.
6.	Group feedback	Each group then provided feedback on different parts of the session to the whole workshop

PARTICIPANTS

 A total of 55 people attended the workshop, including the Councillors for the Doxford Ward, local residents and people who worked locally.

GROUP SESSION 2: RESPONSE TO THE MASTERPLAN

Following the presentation, each group then broke off into a discussion about the masterplan, to understand whether their hopes and fears had been realised and what questions they still had about the scheme. A summary of comments from all groups has been provided below. These will be circulated to the project team for consideration as they revise the masterplan:

Questions

- Is there demand for these homes?
- What effect will new population have on local schools/ healthcare services/ public transport?
- What will the effect be on roads/ how will this be mitigated?
- How will wildlife move around the site?
- What are the parking levels on the site?
- Capacity of local schools?
- How are flooding issued being dealt with?
- What mix of homes will be provided? Executive/ Social ect.
- How long will it take to come forward? Length of development process?

Concerns

- Location of local centre disruptive for neighbouring properties on Weymouth Road
- Concerns of main access opposite school
- Concerns about providing flats as part of the scheme
- Concerns about providing any shops as part of the scheme
- Not enough green space
- More greenspace along Weymouth Road to act as a buffer against existing properties
- Amount of housing proposed for the site too high

Comments

- Change the place names Garth has negative connotations connected to crime
- Move local centre further into the centre of the scheme (away from existing housing)
- Issues with parking in existing neighbourhoods new scheme should provide adequate parking
- Would like to see playground/ playspace provided
- Need a range of house-types, to include detached bungalows and houses designed for an ageing population

RESPONSE TO COMMON COMMENTS

The workshop identified four common objectives which were mentioned by a number of the groups. We have also provided our response below:

Topic	Comment:	Our Response:
Access and Transport	Concerns were raised about how the new development would affect the local road network, and whether any road improvements would be required to increase capacity.	Our transport and highways engineers at Cundall are looking into these issues and will have further information at the second exhibition. As part of the planning application we are required to provide a transport assessment to show the effect of developmenton existing highways and how we are mitigating these.
Existing Amenities	Concerns were also raised about how the new population would effect public services.	The area is designated for residential-led development as part of the planned growth within the South Sunderland Growth Area. Whilst a new school will not be provided as part of
		our scheme, an education contribution will be made (this is a legal requirement).
		The Regeneration Team at SCC are currently exploring opportunities to extend two existing schools in the local area, fully supported by the Education Officer.
		Cundall are also looking into the effects of the new development on other public services, and this information will be provided at the second exhibition.
New Amenities	Concerns were raised about the location of the new local centre being so close to Weymouth Road.	We are looking into several different options for the local centre, locating it closer to the centre of the scheme and further away from existing housing.
Landscaping and Greenspace	There were a number of comments about increasing the amount of greenspace to provide greater buffers between existing and new properties.	Colour, the Landscape Architects are developing a landscaping strategy to conserve and enhance the natural features of the site where posisble, and create new, high quality greenspace in the form of parks, pocket parks and playspaces. They are also looking into increasing green buffers between existing and proposed properties. Further information will be provided at our upcoming October exhibition.

NEXT STEPS

The session was really useful in gauging local people's reactions to the emerging masterplan and we understand that a development of this scale poses a number of issues to the local community.

The workshop was also useful in raising a number of questions which can be asnwered as the proposals are drawn up in more detail, so these will be taken on board and we aim to answer these in due course.

We are keen to continue the discussion with local people to try and alleviate some of these concerns and adjust the masterplan where possible. The masterplan will be displayed at a wider public consultation event on **Saturday 17th October** to get further feedback:

The feedback from this event will be collated and circulated to the design team, to inform further work on the masterplan. Following this, the updated masterplan will then be displayed at the third consultation event due to take place in **late 2015/ early 2016**.

The planning application for the site is then due to be submitted in early 2016.
