- Historic terraced housing stock lends itself to efficient eco 'retro-fitting'
- Chance to reinforce the reputation of planning

- ...It was a realistic reflection of the importance of the historic environment to the social sustainability of a place" Anthony Fyson 2008










2. The Opportunity – Historic buildings are flexible Terraced homes make up some 25% of stock

Historic terraced streets provide an attractive, walkable residential environment at high densities



The Opportunity – Historic buildings are flexible
Historic terraces are efficient to retro-fit into ecohomes (Newcastle eco-terrace)



Less external wall space; good for district heating provision; solar roofing; cladding; etc.

2. The Opportunity – Historic buildings are flexible Upgrading is more cost-effective on a group basis



But still not currently viable unless public sector led.
